# FEATURE SUPPLIER PROFILE MARIAN RENNIE ART



She is an outstanding, world-renowned, Australian artist - and art is just part of the story of the talented Marian Rennie

Marian has created costume and theatre sets for films and cabaret shows such as Fifi L'Amour. She has designed costumes for Circus Oz and doona covers for Linen House. She created The Last Laugh theatre restaurant set in Melbourne and has hosted radio shows on stations such as Melbourne's first community radio, 3CR.

'Life in the late 70s was fun,' says Marian, who shared houses with people like the acclaimed cinematographer, Barry Helleren - Barry went on to represent Marian with exhibitions in Japan and Dubai. She painted the bodies for the Mondo Rock film clip and she even used to make blimps. Remember the hot air advertising balloons?

One of her blimps stole the show at the Melbourne Cup in the early 1980s. During the running of the race someone cut one of the blimps loose. Marian wasn't watching at the time - she was drinking Champagne - but there was a man watching and he followed the blimp to Acheron, where, amazingly, it landed in a paddock next to Marian's property.

'That was 40 years ago', laughs Marian, 'everyone cheered the blimp instead of the horses.'

Today, Marian is feeding guests in her restaurant art gallery, Rennie's at Acheron, which is nestled in the magnificent gardens of her family's 1940s heritage property in Acheron, Victoria.

Rennie's at Acheron is a local institution. It began as Wasabi Jack (named after her cat) in 1981. Rennie's is a no-menu restaurant with a great reputation.

Nestled in the homestead gardens, guests are surrounded by local art, including Marian's and are seated in one beautiful room that acts as the kitchen and the restaurant.

Marian is one of eight kids and credits her mother as the strongest influence in her life. Both her mother and father had great expectations, but they were also down to earth.

'My mother was passionate about education and creative expression ... And food was a big part of life - Mum was





always feeding, and she bought my first oil paints.' says Marian, 'She gave us wings.'

Marian may have had a rebellious youth, but she no longer wants the pace of the city and today she is relaxed - she loves her country family life.

What Marian finds most challenging about her business is changing from painting, to cooking, marketing, selling, cleaning, and gardening.

'I've got to be so versatile,' she says.

Marian's advice to artists is, 'Ride the tides.'

'It will change but keep doing what you do and don't be influenced by trends. Keep on your path and fit your product into that world.'

Galleries are changing and there are more and more online, but it is Marian's strong belief that it's important to see art, which is why she keeps her gallery experience alive - to keep art tactile.

Marian believes life is about connectivity - networks that celebrate both change and progress. 'We are developing a contemporary rural culture, recreating the bush,' says Marian, 'that's what we are doing.'

'This next generation is bringing the whole world back to the country' says Marian.


